

# Florida Wing Prepares for Hurricane Season with Incident Management Team Disaster Response Exercise

Civil Air Patrol's Florida Wing conducted a week-long virtual exercise June 12-17 to verify the readiness of the wing's Incident Management Team (IMT) and to train additional members in the various roles required to run a successful disaster response mission. The tabletop exercise written by Lt. Col John May, the Wing Director of Emergency Services included using updated data management systems that emerged after last year's Hurricane Ian response when new mission tasking components were added at the request of state and federal agencies including pre-storm oblique aerial photos, post-storm ground orthomosaic imagery collection, and high-water mark measurement teams. Since this was a tabletop exercise, no actual air or ground sorties were launched, but many members who serve on those teams supported the exercise by providing simulated data to the IMT as if the sorties had physically been conducted. In all, nearly 100 Florida Wing members participated or supported this exercise.



The scenario for this exercise was that fictional Hurricane Allison made landfall north of Miami as a category 4 storm and took a northwest track across the state and exited the west coast just above Tampa as a weak category 1 storm. While in the gulf, the storm strengthened to a category 3 hurricane, made a second landfall at St. George Island near Apalachicola and weakened as it continued its track into Georgia. Numerous tornadoes spawned off the hurricane north and east of the storm center as it travelled through the peninsula and there was significant flooding statewide.

The exercise included pre-storm hazard planning to conduct wing-wide storm preparation and readiness. As the wing progresses through the HURCON levels outlined in the Florida Wing Hurricane Preparedness Plan, all squadrons and groups complete and submit task checklists known as Situation Reports (SITREPS) for each HURCON level to assure Civil Air Patrol assets including buildings, ground vehicles, aircraft, and communications equipment have been secured and moved to safe locations before a hurricane makes landfall. Aircraft and ground vehicles are positioned out of harm's way with the guidance of the wing Hazard Planning Cell team to locations where they could be easily accessed after the storm for disaster response tasking. SITREPS are also used to confirm that our most valuable assets – our members – are safe before and after the storm and to confirm their availability for tasking post-storm.

Once simulated Hurricane Allision moved out into the gulf, the IMT began receiving initial tasking requests from the state and FEMA for aircrews and ground teams for Ft. Lauderdale and Tampa. The IMT trainees responded to the requests by building air and ground sorties, locating emergency services qualified members to perform the required tasks, managed the sorties as they were in the air or in the field, collected the data from the sorties, and completed the required data uploads and reports. Sorties were closed out as the team assured all mission logs, files, collected data, and financial tracking tasks were completed.

The IMT virtual exercise gave team members the opportunity to practice utilizing the new data systems as well as complete or advance their training to serve on the Incident Management Team as Incident Commanders, Public Information Officers, Air Branch Directors, Ground Branch Directors, Communications Leaders, Finance Officers, Safety Officers, and Mission Staff Assistants. The week-long exercise was successful as a valuable refresher for experienced Incident Management Team members and as a platform to train new IMT members.

## Southwest Florida Squadrons Prepare for the 2023 Hurricane Season

Marco Island, Fla. - The motto of Civil Air Patrol (CAP), the Auxiliary of the US Air Force, is *Semper Vigilans*, and the members of the Marco Island Senior Squadron and the Naples Composite Squadron incorporate vigilance and professionalism in every mission they fly as they prepare for another hurricane season.



A training exercise was conducted out of Marco Island Executive Airport on Saturday May 20<sup>th</sup> from the CAP hangar to practice aerial photography, which is and has been a big part of CAP's tasking both before and after each hurricane occurrence for many decades. During these missions, geo-tagged aerial photographs are taken, the images are downloaded to computers and reviewed for quality. The pictures of targets of interest like disaster areas, high storm surge marks, or fallen structures are uploaded to the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) global database thus expediting FEMA's ability to evaluate the damage and distribute needed emergency resources.

As we enter the new hurricane season, Civil Air Patrol's Florida Wing will be conducting several training exercises across the state to ensure all Florida squadrons are ready to respond to any and all upcoming storm events, support local and state agencies assessment efforts, facilitate FEMA recovery operations and help provide needed support to Florida communities.

Marco Island Senior Squadron trains to ensure mission readiness by holding frequent practical exercises. The training recently conducted included several air sorties tasked with photo reconnaissance including the preparation of cameras and equipment, mission briefings, participating in realistic scenarios and practicing using required ground to ground and air to ground radio communications. Remember that Civil Air Patrol volunteers give their personal time, which involves leaving their families, to fly these needed missions. We take to heart our motto of "Always Vigilant"!

Cadets who are 18 years of age or older may train to be a Mission Observer, but cadets under 18 may attend the ground portion of the training or attend in support of MO training by serving in other roles as Mission Staff Assistants or Communications team members.











# First to Respond Should Be the First to Prepare

In preparation for another hurricane season, Florida Wing squadrons across the wing have been holding Emergency Services exercises for the last several weeks with many more planned. Aircrews, ground teams, and mission base staff have been honing their skills and completing qualifications for additional operation qualifications.

Our ability to respond to disaster situations as an organization is directly dependent upon our volunteer members being individually prepared beyond Civil Air Patrol operational training by preparing themselves and their homes well before a severe weather event.

Now is a good time to plan and prepare homes, businesses, and meeting locations by identifying potential hazards and determining damage mitigation actions in case a storm threatens their local area. Gathering storm supplies, identifying local emergency shelter locations, creating an evacuation plan, and knowing the local flood zones should be completed well before a storm is anticipated. Be sure to include pets and prescription refills in your plan.

One of the best resources with information about preparing emergency kits, evacuation routes, flood zones, and shelters is on the Florida Disaster website at https://www.floridadisaster.org/planprepare/

After severe weather events, the same website provides recovery information with links on their home page.

Squadrons should also plan and prepare to secure their meeting locations and assets. While FLWG Operations will typically plan for sheltering aircraft, units are responsible for protecting vehicles, radio equipment, computers and other assets. If a squadron has their own building, members should include damage mitigation as part of their severe weather plan.

As Civil Air Patrol members, we should consider it as part of our service to our communities to not only complete our training and become competent in operational qualifications, but to also personally prepare to remain in a true state of readiness to respond when our communities are in need.

# Florida Wing Member Assists Pennsylvania Wing with Orthomosaic Camera Integration

**Harrisburg, Pa.-** Capt. David Bynum of the SRQ Composite Squadron of Sarasota traveled to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania in May to assist in orthomosaic camera instruction. At the request of Lt. Col. Ron Olienyk, CAP National Orthomosaic Imagery Program Manager, the Capital City Composite Squadron of the Pennsylvania Wing needed instruction in using the camera system.

The Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) purchased 2 complete photographic imagery units for the Pennsylvania Wing to perform orthomosaic imagery for the State of Pennsylvania. Capt. Bynum has significant hands-on experience with this system having flown numerous sorties after Hurricane Ian in 2022.


During the three days of training in Harrisburg, Capt. Bynum flew 6 training sorties instructing pilots and observers the operation and utilization of the camera system. At the request of PEMA, Capt. Bynum flew a real-world tasking sortie for imagery of an area that PEMA needed to document and as a demonstration of capabilities.

CAP members are also engaged in development work to integrate the Garmin G1000 and autopilot to reduce the amount of hand flying previously necessary. When asked about the experience, Capt. Bynum replied, "This is an example how the Civil Air Patrol is continually increasing the service capability to the citizenry by new technology and cross unit instruction"

## What is Orthomosaic Imagery?

Over the last few years, Civil Air Patrol has added to its photographic capabilities by adding the ability to produce 3D 360-degree images using special camera equipment. The first time this camera system was used in Florida Wing was during the disaster response missions following Hurricane Michael in 2018.

## **Civil Air Patrol Joins Search for Missing Diver**

**June 26, 2023** – Civil Air Patrol's Florida Wing is helping search for a missing diver after being activated by the Air Force Rescue Coordination Center at the U.S. Coast Guard Southeast's request.

This morning three CAP aircraft conducted an aerial search from Jupiter to Lighthouse Point along the coastline to about 1 mile offshore.

Acting as a Total Force partner and official civilian auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force, Civil Air Patrol helps First Air Force rapidly respond to nonmilitary threats domestically in a Defense Support of Civil Authorities capacity to save lives, relieve suffering, prevent property damage, and provide humanitarian assistance.

The missing diver was with a group exploring the sunken Lady Luck in the Deerfield Beach area Saturday and failed to surface with the other members of the diving party. Coast Guard air and surface crews along with local partner agencies have been searching for Erick Gaunt, described as a white male in his 30s last seen wearing a black wetsuit with yellow and white air tanks.





### Final Salute to Former Homestead ARB Cadet Squadron Commander Pedro Jimenez

Pedro M. ("Pete") Jimenez was born on Puerto Rico on 3 April 1971 and moved with his family to south Florida early in life. Following graduation from high school, he enlisted in the United States Army, where he served on active duty and with the reserve component for roughly a decade, including a deployment to Southwest Asia with the 24th Mechanized Infantry Division for Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. He served as a communications wireman, armored vehicle driver, and was the Noncommissioned Officer-in-Charge of his unit's Tactical Operations Center. Returning stateside, he eventually transitioned to the reserve component and began a career with the telephone company as a lineman. Through mergers and corporate restructuring, he began working with AT&T, taking on leadership roles as a part of their disaster response team and in their new product research and testing section.

Joining CAP two weeks after his son Daniel joined as a cadet in June of 2017, he rapidly began training to advance his skills, demonstrating a thirst to learn and to train others to maximize their CAP experience. By October of 2018, he had earned an aircrew rating, communications technician rating, and had assumed command of the Homestead Air Reserve Base Cadet Squadron. Starting in March of 2020, he confronted the COVID-19 pandemic by rapidly adapting the squadron to the virtual meeting format, seeking out and developing productive training material that set the stage for unit success. He led the effort to design a new squadron logo and patch, which was approved and has been extremely well received by members of the unit as it has grown in size.

A thoughtful yet decisive leader, he took steps to maximize opportunities to train on emergency services tasks during the latter stages of the pandemic, building a core group of motivated and skilled junior cadet leaders who would go on to become the senior NCO and officer cadre as the squadron expanded nearly three-fold over the last two years. He worked diligently to encourage cadets and senior members to further their qualifications and prepare for advancement, growing many qualified future leaders and mentoring many new seniors to ensure continuity of leadership for the squadron. His efforts led to the squadron being recognized as the Group 7 Cadet Squadron of the Year for 2021 and 2022, attaining Aerospace Education Excellence and Quality



Cadet Unit Award standards in 2022, and prepared the unit for an operational deployment for high water mark assessment in the wake of Hurricane Ian in October 2022.

Captain Jimenez attained qualifications as a Mission Radio Operator and Ground Team Member-3, and due to his solid knowledge and skillful instructional capabilities was approved to serve as a skills evaluator in those ratings. He was technician rated in the Cadet Programs, Safety, and Command Specialty Tracks, and most recently completed requirements for his Aerospace Education Master rating. He completed Level 4 and was a graduate of the Squadron and Group Commander's Courses. Always one to

give back to his organization, he became a VolU instructor, where he participated in instruction during training sessions for Levels 1-3. He relinquished command of the Homestead Air Reserve Base Cadet Squadron in January 2023, shifting roles to serve as squadron Deputy Commander.

Captain Jimenez is survived by his wife Maria, step daughter Elizabeth, and son Daniel.

## **Wright Brothers Award**

The Wright Brothers Award in the CAP Cadet Program launched in 2003, during the centennial of Orville and Wilbur Wright's historic first flight.

Cadets earn the award upon completing Phase I, "The Learning Phase," consisting of the Cadet Program's first three achievements. As such, the award recognizes excellence in all four areas of cadet life: leadership, aerospace, fitness, and character. In addition, Wright Brothers Award recipients have passed a challenging, closed-book examination testing leadership knowledge and proficiency in drill and ceremonies.

Once a cadet earns the Wright Brothers Award, he or she is promoted to the grade of cadet staff sergeant and begins service as a cadet non-commissioned officer. Cadet NCOs are expected to transition from individuals who have been cared for to young servant-leaders who care

for others as they enter Phase II of the Cadet Program – The Leadership Phase.

With General Mitchell as their role model, cadet officers know that speaking truth to power is a moral duty. The Mitchell Award marks completion of Phase II of the CAP Cadet Program, recognizing sustained excellence in all four areas of cadet life: leadership, aerospace, fitness, and character. Further, Mitchell cadets must have passed comprehensive examinations on leadership and aerospace topics and have completed a week-long encampment immersing them in a challenging Core Values and Stem environment.

The U.S. Air Force respects Mitchell Award recipients' accomplishments. Mitchell cadets who enlist in the Air Force enter the service at the advanced grade of E-3, Airman First Class. The service also looks favorably upon Mitchell cadets when evaluating AFROTC and Academy applicants.

Once a cadet earns the Mitchell Award, he or she becomes a cadet officer, is promoted to the grade of cadet second lieutenant, and is challenged to lead and serve junior-ranking cadets, while continuing to develop into a "dynamic American and aerospace leader."

The General Ira C. Eaker Award is the CAP Cadet Program's second most prestigious award and honors one of the forefathers of an independent Air Force.

The Eaker Award marks completion of Phase IV of the CAP Cadet Program, recognizing sustained excellence in all four areas of cadet life: leadership, aerospace, fitness, and character.

Further, cadets will have graduated from an academically-intensive leadership academy to qualify for this honor, which is especially appropriate considering that today, the Air Force celebrates Gen Eaker's legacy by naming the service's top school for commanders in his honor – the Ira C. Eaker Center for Professional Development at Air University, Maxwell AFB, Ala. To stand in General Eaker's shadow is to study leadership carefully and serve others.

To further illustrate the significance of this accomplishment, only 1416 Eaker Awards have been presented since the award's inception in 1998.

Once a cadet earns the General Ira C. Eaker Award, he or she is promoted to the grade of cadet lieutenant colonel and is challenged to lead and serve junior-ranking cadets not just in the hometown squadron but around their wing (state) as well. After earning the Eaker Award, only the prestigious Spaatz Award Examination remains for the young person to conquer as a CAP cadet.




